Staging Portraits: Queer community photos at The Bearded Tit

Staging Portraits (2022 – ongoing) is a portrait series of the community at The Bearded Tit, a queer institution and bar in Redfern. Through photographs and written responses, it offers a glimpse into the ways queer people have redefined concepts of home and family, often out of necessity and survival. The work engages with the legacy of studio portraiture as a means of self-representation and its relationship to queer visual aesthetics.

In response to continued transphobic and homophobic violence, *Staging Portraits* also seeks to explore the joy and pleasure in the relationships we cultivate with one another. Ultimately, it is a love letter to The Bearded Tit — a devotion to sacred queer kinships formed while dancing, drinking, crying, laughing, and embracing.

Staging Portraits has been produced on the stolen lands of the Gadigal people of the Eora nation. I would like to pay our respects to their elders — past, present, and emerging — and to any Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people encountering this work. In addition, Redfern (where The Bearded Tit is located) is a suburb that has been and continues to be crucial for Aboriginal civil rights and activism. Through this acknowledgement, I hope to demonstrate a commitment to dismantling the legacies of settler-colonialism and to acknowledge the theft and violence inherent to our settlement of these lands.

Dorcas Tang 邓佳颖 is a third-generation Chinese-Malaysian photographer and artist currently working, thinking, and playing on unceded Gadigal land. She is interested in the crucial intersections of photography, history, and archival silences. As a daughter of the Chinese diaspora, at the core of her practice is consent and care for her communities while grappling with the intrinsic violence of the camera and archival practices. Her visual projects include *Los Paisanos del Puerto*, examining the Chinese diaspora of Costa Rica, and *Love Me Long Time*, exploring desire, intimacy, and Asian identity. Ultimately, she seeks to encourage critical dialogue through creating socially engaged visual narratives.
